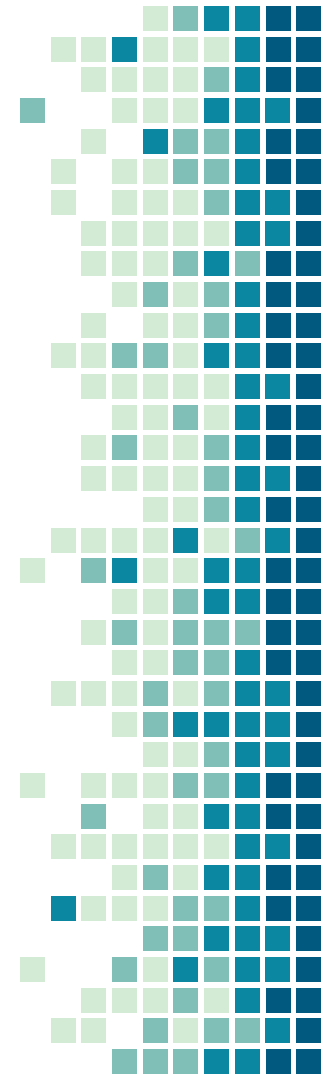
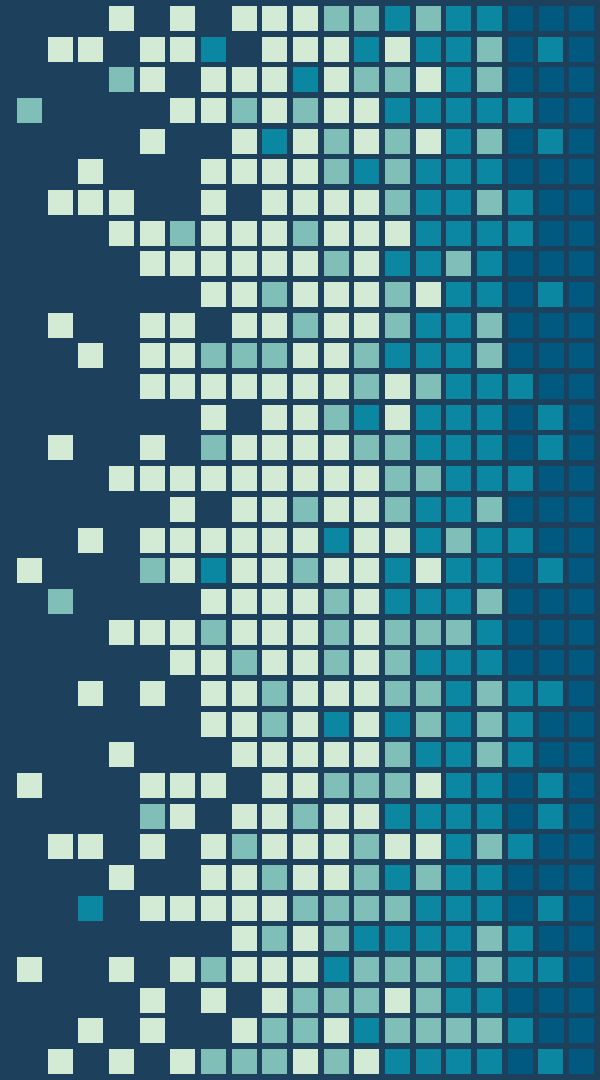

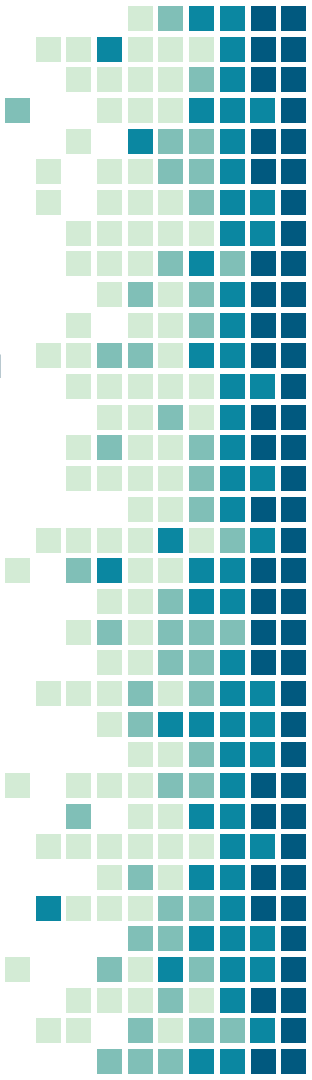
Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP)

What is OSAP?

- OSAP is a government financial aid program for post-secondary students funded by the provincial and federal governments
- It provides Ontario students with financial assistance to help them pay for college or university
- OSAP is based on financial need

What types of financial aid are available?

- Through **one** application, you will be considered for non-repayable grants, as well as an OSAP loan
- **Grants** = money that you will not have to repay
- **Loans** = borrowed money that you will have to repay. Loans are interest and payment-free while you are in school full time



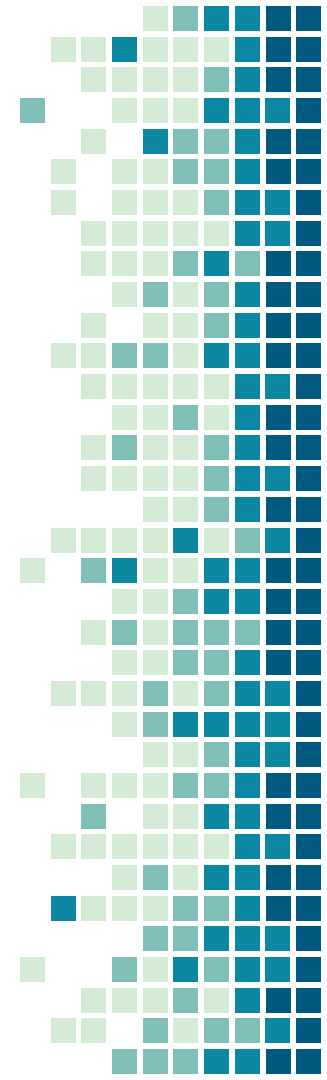
Am I eligible for OSAP?

To be eligible for OSAP, you must be:

- A Canadian citizen, permanent resident or protected person
- An Ontario resident
- Currently attending or entering an OSAP-approved program and school
- Currently enrolled in or entering a certificate, degree or diploma program

Can I get OSAP if I want to study outside of Ontario?

- Yes, you can still receive OSAP if you enroll in a public college or university program **outside of Ontario**
- If you want to study **outside of Canada**, you can still be eligible to receive partial OSAP funding

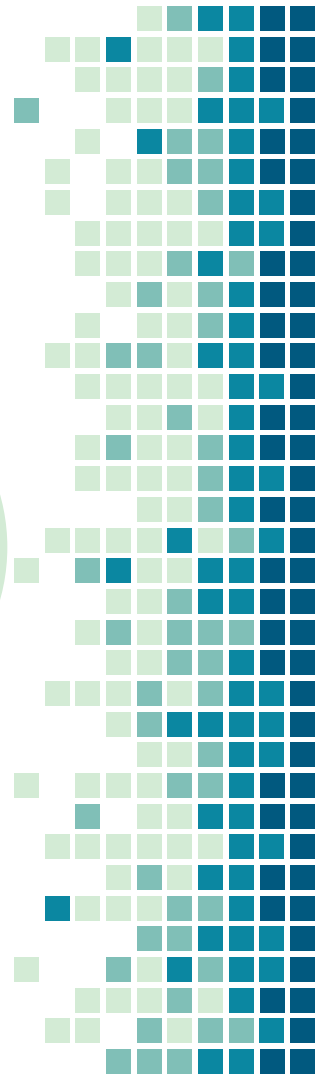

How is OSAP aid determined?



The amount of money you can get depends on your **educational costs** and your **personal financial situation**.



How is OSAP aid determined? (cont'd)

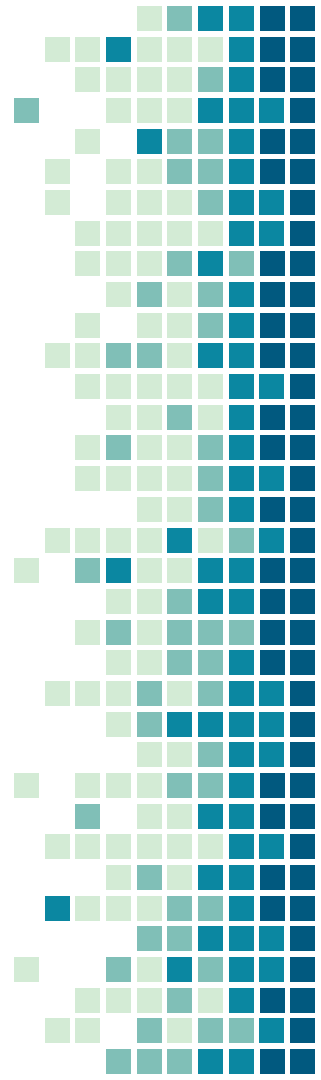
Educational Costs

- Tuition & compulsory fees
- Books & supplies
- Equipment
- Computer costs
- Personal living expenses
- Travel

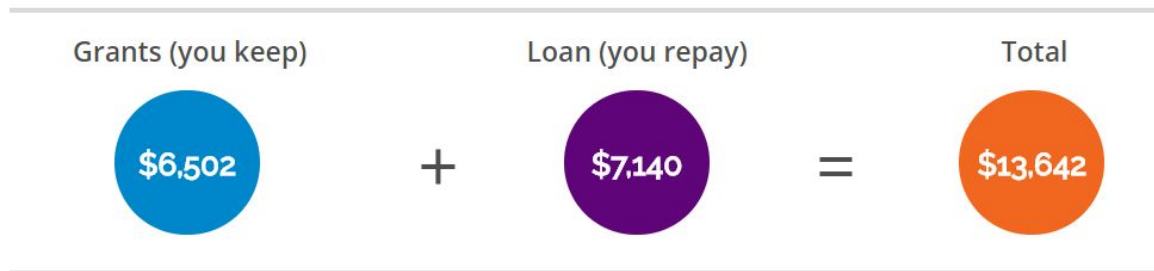
Financial Resources

- Student contribution (**\$3,000**)
- Award income (e.g. scholarships)
- Student study-period income (anything over \$5,600 per term)
- Parental income (will be based on 2017 tax return)
- Assets (TFSA's, GIC's, CSB's)

*** RESP's and PSSSP (band funding) are no longer considered when assessing your financial need



OSAP: Sample Funding Summary

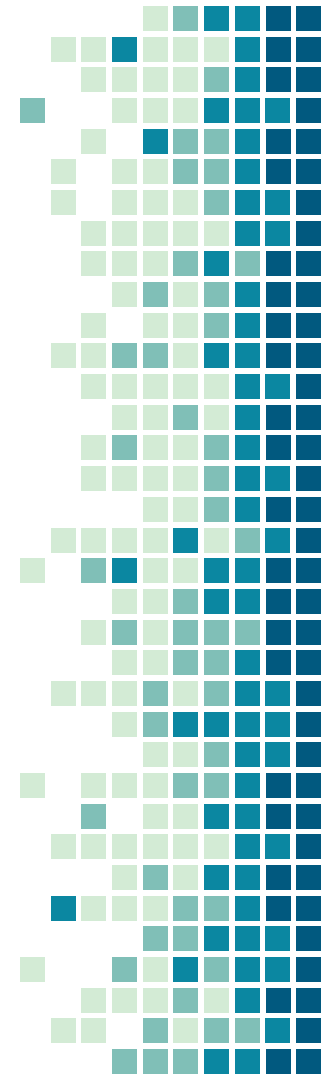

The New OSAP

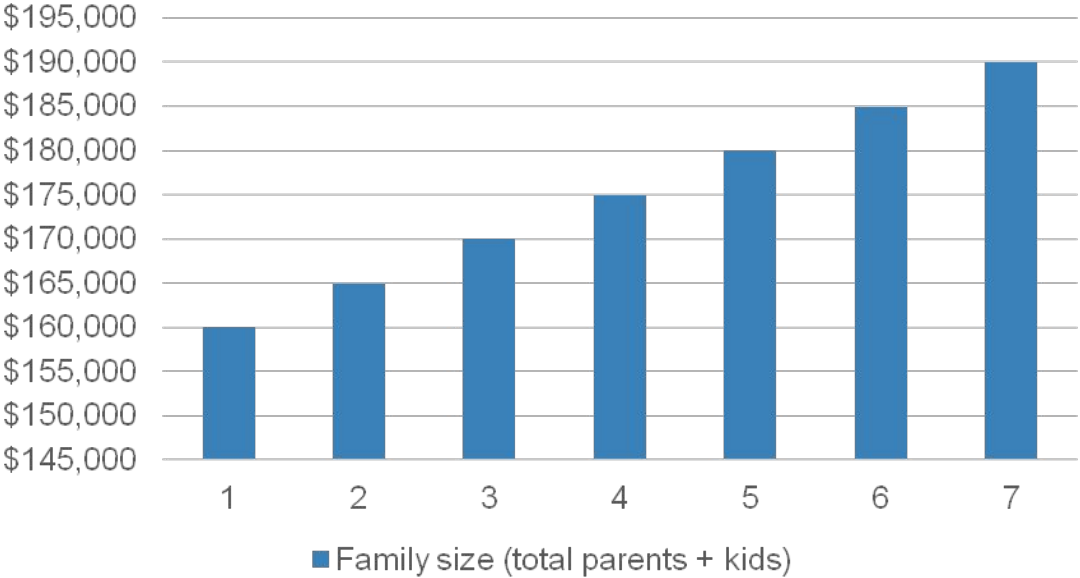
What does free tuition mean?

- For 2017-18, Ontario consolidated a number of existing provincial grants into one up-front grant, the Ontario Student Grant.
- Eligible students can receive grant funding through OSAP that equals or exceeds the average cost of tuition for an undergraduate arts or science degree in Ontario
- The “average tuition” amount the promise is pegged to for 2018-19 is \$6,700 for Ontario university students (a 3% increase over last year)
- Even if your family’s income is more than \$50,000, you will still receive grants and loans to help pay for school.
- Students can request grant-only funding and decline the loan

Availability of grant funding based on family size and income



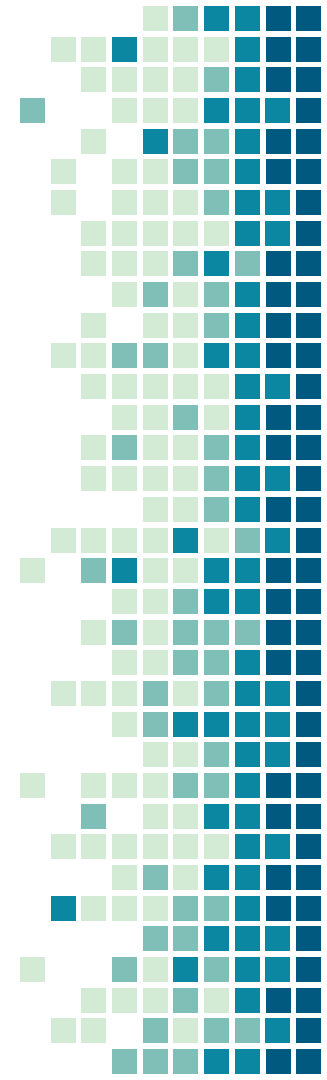

Estimates



What's new for 2018-19

- OSAP Application opens in November 2017
- OUAC and OSAP application systems linked (OCAS and OSAP too)
- Streamlined application and application process
- Reduced Expected Parental Contributions for dependent students
- RESP withdrawals are no longer counted as a resource. Students no longer report these amounts.
- Student assets are no longer counted as a resource for the Federal portion of assessment
- Introduction of **“Net Tuition Estimates”**



Net Estimates

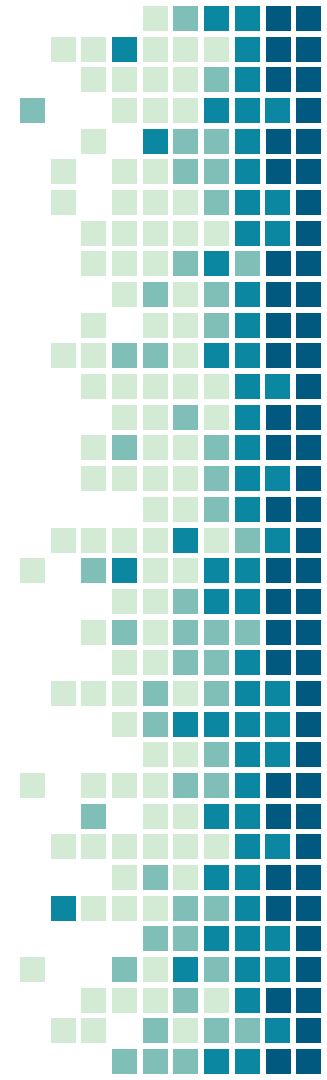
- Students will be provided with online 'net' estimates as soon as they complete their OSAP application(s)
- This estimate will be updated as institutional award information becomes available
- Estimates will be based on data entered by student and on program cost data and institutional award data supplied by schools.

Multiple applications = multiple estimates

- Net Estimates are provided per OSAP application.
(Most students will have more than one open OSAP application)
- Students will be able to view and compare estimates "side-by-side" both online (from November onward) and on paper. In April of 2018, OSAP will mail a net estimate document (letter + tables) to students.

Net Estimates (cont'd)

Ministry Label	Description/Notes
School Information	School and program information
Tuition	Note: This is the program's base tuition fee only (does not include compulsory ancillary fees, or residence/housing charges)
OSAP: Grants	Federal (CSG) and Provincial (OSG) grant funding
OSAP: Loans	Federal and provincial student loans available to borrow
Awards: School	Institutional awards (scholarships/bursaries)
Awards: Other	Student-reported awards
"How much tuition I pay"	Amount of tuition not covered by OSAP and/or Awards
"What's left for other costs?"	What's left over after tuition is paid (broken down by loan and grant)



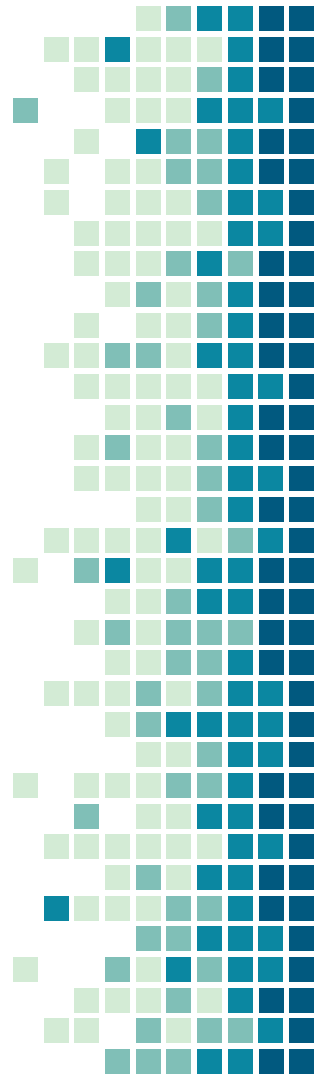

Applying for OSAP



Applying for OSAP


- ✓ Go to ontario.ca/osap
- ✓ Click “Register to create your profile. You’ll receive an email when it’s time to apply”
- ✓ Log in and click “start new app” to fill out the application
- ✓ Gather all required documents. Upload your documents online, or mail/deliver them to your financial aid office
- ✓ Print, sign and submit your MSFAA to a designated Canada Post office. The MSFAA is your lifetime loan agreement)
- ✓ Track the status of your application online and learn how much money you’ll get.
